46 days after the Gulf oil spill commenced, oil is still leaking from the well even though a cap has been placed on a pipe. There has been a lot of media coverage about the extent of the oil spill, fouled beaches, oil-soaked birds, fishermen who have lost their livehood etc. But there is no comprehensive overview of the potential environmental costs of the oil spill/leak.
