It is well known by now that the 2010 sockeye salmon return to the Fraser River defied all expectations and was the highest in a century. This came on the heels of very low returns in previios years. The government had established a Commission of Inquiry to investigate those poor returns. It was just getting started when the extraordinary 2010 return occurred.

Noted oceanographer Dr. Timothy Parsons is pushing a novel explanation for the superabundant 2010 returns. He claims that it was probably caused by a volcanic eruption in Alaska, in 2008.
